The **County Recognition Adviser** role is an exciting opportunity to be part of the County team of volunteers to deliver good guiding in your County and to ensure that girls have amazing opportunities. This is for a term of **3 years** and is a Girlguiding Ulster **County Commissioner** appointment. You will be expected to attend County Executive meetings along with any ad hoc meetings as required.











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As County Recognition Adviser what will I be expected to do?

While the County Commissioner leads the County this does not mean that the County Commissioner does everything herself. Your key roles will be to track new volunteers as they enter Girlguiding for the first time to volunteer either with a unit or in a supportive role and thanking and recognising the volunteers in your County.

You will be part of a team of Volunteers who will help deliver the County action plan. You will be expected to attend County Executive meetings and report on your areas of work. The members of the County Executive are the trustees of the County and as such, in addition to their own areas of expertise, they will have joint responsibility for ensuring that the County is well run, financially viable and delivering on what the County is expected to do.

As County County Recognition Adviser your role will include;

- Ensure new volunteers are contacted within the recommended time scale
- Track the volunteer as they move through the system
- Contact the volunteer and provide a link to the county team and district commissioner in their own district
- Provide the welcome pack produced by GGU, ensuring the county data is up to date
- Ensure all compliance has been obtained and providing the necessary links to other county / district team members if required
- Provide a link / buddy person to provide support for the volunteer in their unit.
- Thanking and recognising the volunteers in your county including:

 GGU 1 and 3 year service awards; GGU 15 and 25 year awards; Ivy Awards; leaving and retiring guiding letter from the CC and DC etc













What training and support will be available?

Training available to you will include:



- Training to help to develop skills and abilities to perform the role (including e-learning where possible)
- On-going support and development from fellow volunteers, including the County Commissioner and the County Team.
- Girlguiding Ulster or your County will reimburse agreed expenses

What skills, knowledge and experience do you need?

Being a great County Recognition Adviser involves lots of different skills, but some of the most essential are:

People skills - being supportive, open, approachable

Creative and enthusiastic

Reliable and Trust worthy

Ability to work as part of a team

Time management skills – getting things done efficiently and planning

Taking on the role of County Recognition Adviser is a great way of learning new skills such as teamwork, leadership skills, event planning, budgeting, time management, communication and motivation.
